Dear Scout Families,

NEWS AND NOTES:

Youth Protection Training: On August 24, 2018, I received an up to date report from Washington District regarding Youth Protection training. As of that date, about 1/2 of the Leadership in Troop 3 have not completed their new Youth Protection Training. If you would like to see if you are on that list, please check with me. Please be advised that if you do not complete the new YPT Training by October 1, 2018, you will not be permitted to attend trips or other events. In addition, when it comes time to re-charter, you **WILL NOT** be rechartered. There will be a classroom YPT training on Monday September 17, 2018 at the Hatboro Baptist Church Annex beginning at 7:30 PM. This would be a great opportunity to get this important training completed.

Changes to Parent Guide: At the August Troop Committee meeting, the committee approved two major changes to the Troop 3 Parent Guide. The first change dealt with the process of electing our Senior Patrol Leader. The TLC requested these changes and the committee approved. Now, in order to be elected to the position of SPL, a scout must have previously served as either a patrol leader or troop guide and he must have either already attended or is currently registered to attend NYLT. In addition, he must be at least a first-class scout.

The second change deals with adult participation with the troop. Language was added to the section on Adult Participation. Adults who wish to go on outings with the troop and are not registered must complete all background checks, Youth Protection Training and a medical history form parts A and B. Adults going on trips more then 72 hours must also complete part C. In addition, there is language regarding the patrol method and parent involvement with the patrol. Simply put, the patrol learns by failure and parent involvement with the operation of the patrol will not be allowed to occur. Please check out the parent guide for more information. Den Chiefs: Den Chiefs are a very important part of the Boy Scout Program. It gives a scout the ability to learn leadership and at the same time, it shows cub scouts what the boy scout program has to offer. It also helps build lasting relationships between the pack and the troop. Two area cub packs are in need of Den Chiefs. We have been asked by both Pack 554 in Willow Grove and Pack 39 in Horsham. If you are interested and are First Class or higher, please speak to me about this opportunity.

Care of Troop Equipment: About a year ago, the troop purchased brand new tents. Our equipment coordinators have reported two incidents of tents being returned that have caused concern. The first incident involves a tent that was returned soaking wet. This tells me that the tent went home but was never taken out of the bag. The second incident involves a tent that came back with a series of broken poles. We have spent a considerable amount of money on these tents and they should last us a long time. We will undertake some changes to track equipment, but I ask that you as parents help us out. Every scout is expected to take equipment home at the end of a trip. If your son brings something home, please make sure that it is either dried out or cleaned and returned to us as soon as possible. The troop committee and our equipment coordinators thank you for your help.

We need your help: Each month when we return from a trip, I wait for parents to pick up their kids from the church. We instruct the scouts to contact you when we are close so that by the time we get back and cleaned up everyone is ready to go home. Please bear in mind that our adult staff also want to go home but we can't leave until everyone is picked up. Please help us out and pick up your children in a timely manner. We publish the pick-up time in advance and do our very best to stick to that. Sometimes things happen that are beyond our control. We thank you in advance for helping us with this issue.
